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## **2000 Elections Primer for North Carolina**

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The Program on Southern Politics, Media and Public Life presents its first issue of *North Carolina DataNet* since the publication moved from the Odum Institute to our Program at UNC-CH. In this “2000 Elections Primer for North Carolina” issue, we want to provide you with some background data on previous presidential and gubernatorial election years in North Carolina. We hope you find the information in this issue helpful as you watch, listen to and then consider the election results of 2000. Here is what you will find in this issue:

- \*How major party’s candidates for president and governor fared over the 20<sup>th</sup> Century.
- \*How rapidly the NC body politic has grown over the past few decades reflecting the sweeping demographic, social and economic changes we continue to experience here.
- \*Which of the state’s 100 counties have served as “bellwethers” in terms of voting for the winning gubernatorial candidate in the 10 gubernatorial elections from 1960 to 1996.
- \*How Jim Hunt has been the Democrats’ “firewall” in these elections since 1972.
- \*How turnout “falls-off” as voters move down the ballot from presidential and gubernatorial elections to lower offices being contested and referenda on bonds and constitutional questions.
- \*Voting results in the last four presidential and gubernatorial election years - 1984, 1988, 1992, 1996 – plus a scorecard for you to use in assessing the 2000 election results.
